photographs of nature by author April Pulley Sayre. Grab an umbrella, slide on some rain boots, and enjoy exploring the rain!



Try a Fun Activity



Rain Cloud in a Jar

- Food coloring
- Water
- A clear jar
- Shaving cream
- Plastic pipettes

- 1. Mix a few drops of food coloring into some water and set it aside
- 2. Fill a clear glass jar about 3/4 of the way full with cool water
- 3. Add shaving cream to the top. This will act as the "cloud"
- 4. Using the pipette, suck up some of the colored water and squirt on top of the shaving cream cloud to make it "rain"
- 5. Keep adding more water until "raindrops" make their way through the shaving cream cloud and create the rainstorm.
