Zoom, Zoom, Zoom!

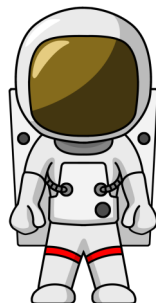
Zoom, zoom, zoom,

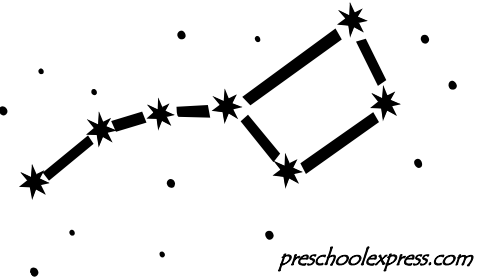
Activity Ideas:

Eat the Moon Space Snack: You will need plain rice cakes (one for each child), softened cream cheese, banana(s), plastic knives, and Cheerios (optional). Instruct the children use a plastic knife to spread cream cheese onto their rice cake. Help children slice the banana (four or five will fit on each rice cake), then place them onto the cream cheese to resemble moon craters. If desired, add Cheerios for small craters.

Creative Constellations:

- ★ Display and discuss pictures of simple constellations, such as the Big Dipper.
- ★ Give each of your children a piece of black paper and several star stickers.
- ★ Invite them to invent their own constellations by arranging their stars on their papers any way they wish and then joining the stars with a white crayon or chalk.
- ★ Encourage your children to make up names for their constellations.

Out Of This World Celestial Art: Pour white paint into a spray bottle, then dilute it with water. Children spritz a sheet of black construction paper with the diluted paint (not too much!) for a spattered effect. While it dries, instruct them to cut circles (planets) of various sizes from different colors of paper (a great use for scraps of paper and/or magazines), then glue them on the black background. Decorate the project with foil stars and glitter so it resembles outer space.
